8. Bring Flat Juliette on your next outing.
9. Visit one of the Traveling Historical Exhibits.
10. Wear your Girl Scout pin for 100 days, or more!
11. Save spare change for 100 days and donate it to help Girl Scouts in Connecticut, or the World Friendship fund.
12. Be part of the Girls Voices Survey.
13. List 100 ways to enjoy Girl Scout Cookies.
14. Make a collage of 100 things that says "Girl Scouts" to you.
15. Wear a 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary t-shirt.

17. Submit a story about what you did with Flat Juliette on our webpage.
18. Interview someone who was a Girl Scout as a girl, and share with GSOFACT's Historical Committee.
19. Do 100 "good turns."
20. Start a scrap book of what you do in the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary year, share it.
21. Start a scrap book of what your Service Unit does in the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary year, share it.
22. Start a scrap book of what your troop does in the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary year, share it.
23. Think of 100 reasons why you are glad you're a Girl Scout.
24. Research and find out about 100 women who were Girl Scouts.
25. Sell 100 boxes of cookies in our 100<sup>th</sup> year.
26. Make a game that teaches Girl Scout history.
27. Spend at least 100 hours exploring and enjoying GSOFACT properties.
28. Learn or teach 100 Girl Scout Songs.
29. Make a scavenger hunt of 100 things you might find at a Girl Scout Property and then go and find them.
30. Learn to sign the Girl Scout Promise.
31. Get signatures from 100 Girl Scouts – why not on a T-shirt?
32. Memorize the Girl Scout Law.
33. Find a younger Girl, share what you like about Girl Scouts and inspire her to continue in Girl Scouts.
