



Lead On: Your 5 Steps to Silver Award

Ready to earn the Silver Award? Follow these five steps to reach the highest award a Cadette can earn!

Silver Status
Be a registered Cadette (grades 6–8). Before starting, you must earn one Leadership Award <i>or</i> be a Bronze Award Girl Scout . If you are in the middle of your journey - keep going! Journeys will remain eligible to meet prerequisites through October 1, 2026.

Shape Your Silver Team
Work solo or with a small group of up to four Cadettes . You can gather other community members to assist with your project. Remember, Silver Award projects take time and attention! Each Cadette must commit at least 50 hours to planning and carrying out their project, and you can begin anytime in 6th, 7th, or 8th grade.
Find Your Spark
Choose a community issue you care about. Explore the root cause and design a project that creates lasting and measurable change . Use GSUSA and GSOFCT's Silver Award guidelines and resources to help shape your idea.
While there are no required trainings before diving in to your proposal, we highly recommend digging in to all of the resources available to you!
Submit & Get Approved
Share your project proposal through the <u>GSOFCT Silver Award Project Proposal JotForm.</u> Each individual Cadette must submit a project proposal for approval. Our team will review your idea and may provide feedback to help strengthen your plan before you begin.
Go Silver
Carry out your project and keep track of your hours, progress, and impact. When you've finished, an adult who can verify the project's completion can submit <u>one Final Report.</u> Final reports must be submitted by September 30 th of the year the Girl Scouts leave 8 th grade and enter 9 th grade. To be included in the GSOFCT Highest Award Class, reports must be turned in by March 31.

After submission, celebrate your achievement at the Highest Awards Celebration and be recognized for stepping up as a leader in your community.
